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OBSERVATIONS BY BILL

Spring is here; tournaments fill most of our spare time with a few pig and exotic hunts thrown in to help keep the edge on. I know, because I have a busy spring and summer planned! I hope many of you support TBoT by attending the tournaments around the state.

In traveling around east Texas and western Louisiana. I am finding more and more local archery shops closed. The shops that I find open cater to the compound archer because that is where the money is. They can sell a person the bow, sights, stabilizer, quiver, and arrows. Then with a minimum of time that person is shooting well enough to hit a target out to 40 yards or farther. Then within three to six months when the new models come out, they convince that person he needs to update this equipment, starting the process all over. I know one compound owner that is on his fifth bow in 12 months. Traditional archers, on the other hand, buy a bow (no sights, stabilizers, etc.), a quiver (or make their own), and the materials to make their own arrows and usually stick with that equipment for some time. It seems that most traditional archers make most of their own accessories or order them from a supply house from out of state.

In one shop I have entered, the owner was so against traditional archery that he took delight in belittling my equipment to those in the shop. "Too slow..., not accurate..., can't hit past 40 yards..., not worth the money..., too easy to master, no challenge..." I offered to let anyone shoot my equipment but had no takers as long as the shopkeeper was there. I did get lucky and on my first arrow, robin hooded another archer's arrow at 30 yards! (Way to go. Bill!) I offered to pay him for his arrow. He declined but was some kind of impressed!

Not all archery shops are like this. Several do promote traditional archery; they just do not carry the equipment needs of the traditional archer. I cannot blame them as the money is not there for them, and each one of us has our own taste and it would require him to carry too much equipment inventory. But I believe we the traditional archers can or should use our local shops to order equipment whenever we can. Also, if you do have access to a shop that does carry traditional equipment, support them by buying from them before ordering from a supply house that is located out of state. Also, introduce someone to the beauty of traditional archery; I believe our sport is growing, for you see more and more people entering the traditional divisions at local archery tournaments.

CHOKING... And how to prevent it

We've all seen it happen....the basketball player stands at the free throw line with one second left on the clock. His team is down by one point. All he has to do is make two shots to win the game, or at least one to send it to overtime. He's done it at least a thousand times. Bounce, bounce, bounce.....deep breath, shrug of the shoulders, take the ball up, and.....shoot......the result? A miss. So he tries again, this time even more nervous. He notices the scoreboard, his coach, the screaming fans, and tries to concentrate....he shoots, and CHOKES!

Does this sound familiar? How many times have you pulled back an arrow? You shouldn't be nervous. You've done it thousands of times. Is there something you can do to prevent an athlete's worst fear...choking? The answer is a resounding "yes!"

Choking is defined as poor performance despite high motivation to perform well, poor performance that stems from withdrawal of effort.

There are two theories about why choking occurs. Distraction theory proposes that the added pressure of a high-stress situation gives the athlete something else to think about (embarrassment, the consequence of his shot, etc); consequently, he becomes distracted and performs poorly. Overcontrolling theory proposes that as pressure increases, the athlete OVER-CONTROLS what should be automatic. In other words, actual THINKING about your shot too much can cause major problems. The athlete wants so much to succeed that he reverts to a very elementary form of controlling his technique: he essentially says "I'll MAKE myself successful by thinking myself through this shot."

Multiple studies have shown that the over-controlling theory is correct! People tend to perform poorly when the left side of their brain (that controls verbal abilities) is very active. In these cases, the athlete is TALKING himself through the movement. So when you hear someone tell you to stop thinking and just shoot, chances are that they're right!

So, what can you do to fix this problem? Use a preperformance routine. In a sport like archery, a preperformance routine can be helpful when you are trying to avoid choking, avoid overthinking, or maintain attention for long periods of time.

Humans can maintain attention at a high level for only two or three seconds. So when you are competing in a tournament, you will necessarily have an "ebb and flow" of attention. Attention needs to be highest at the moment of performance (shooting). A pre-performance routine will dictate when your attention will be high.

The first phase is the <u>preparation phase</u>. It begins immediately after the previous shot. The main purposes are for relaxation and strategy development. The time may be long or short. If you can choose the length of your preparation phase, make it short if you're shooting well and longer if you're shooting poorly. Now is NOT the time to reanalyze


every minute detail of your technique or make any major adjustments.

The second phase is the <u>trigger</u>. The trigger is a physical or cognitive sign that the preparation phase is over and it's time to start the actual ritual. It could be a word or an action. A typical trigger for 3-D shooting might be stepping up to the stake.

The third phase is called the <u>ritual</u>. The purpose of the ritual is to deepen concentration and build momentum. It is a fixed set of behaviors and cognitions that you will use EVERY TIME you shoot. Why is this ritual so important? It expands the performance. Actually shooting an arrow takes a second or less. But the shot actually begins when you start your ritual. Because you are dictating your attention, it will be high when you perform.

· Ritual Phase

- To deepen concentration and build momentum
- Fixed set of behaviors and cognitions that we'll use every time



THE RITUAL MUST BE CONSISTENT; you must do it exactly the same EVERY TIME! So does this work? Research with pro golfers has shown that when they changed their ritual (e.g. paused too long after the settle and before the swing), their shots were BAD!

When you use a consistent routine, you are dictating when your attention will be highest; it will coincide with your performance.

An alternative to a consistent ritual is just to "wait until it feels good." This can cause major problems because you're not dictating the focus of your attention.

Notes to remember:

- 1) If something interrupts the routine. START OVER from the beginning (preparation, trigger, ritual).
- 2) Routines MUST be used in high-pressure situations.
- 3) An example of a routine for a target archer may look something like this:
- —preparation: walking to the next target, getting a drink of water, talking with friends. looking at the next target
- -trigger: stepping up to the stake and placing your arrow
- —ritual: gripping the bow, looking at the target for two seconds, taking a deep breath in and out, pausing one more second, aiming with your eyes, lifting and pulling the bow (consistent every time), completing the anchor, and release.

You may even include a word or words as part of the ritual. Have you seen the movie For Love of the Game? Kevin Costner portrays a baseball pitcher whose trigger is the phrase "Clear the mechanism." He says it before every pitch. You might consider doing the same!

So is this just a superstition? NO! A superstition (like wearing lucky underwear or eating Fig Newtons before every tournament) controls the athlete, but the athlete controls the routine. If a routine is not working, change it in practice.

Happy shooting and start practicing your routine.... every single shot!!!

RAIN, ANYONE? (February 2003)

What do you do with five inches of rain, 10-12 inches of standing water, and 3-5 inches of mud and you are supposed to hold a shoot? You move inside! After a couple of months planning and work setting up, our area once again was blessed with an excess of rain—forcing some last minute phone calls, quick decision making, and an offer to let us use the indoor range of the local archery shop. Yes, we moved indoors. With little help, targets were moved indoors and set up. With artificial trees, shrubs, and potted plants you would have thought you were in the woods again. Luckily, Trophy Hunter of Beaumont has an indoor range large enough to allow four shooters to shoot at a time at targets up to 40 yards away. The next concern was, "Will they come - now that we have built it?" Close to 40 people did come and compete in the modified shoot of 20 targets that were shot twice in order to have a total of 40 shots.

Many thanks to Glynn Walker and his staff at Beaumont Trophy Hunter Archery for shutting down his inside range and turning it over to TBoT to use for this shoot. Glynn was so impressed with the people who came to shoot and their equipment, that he ordered a long bow and a recurve from two different bowyers who came to shoot at the tournament. Also, eight traditional shooters were signed up for membership with TBoT and two pre-registrations were taken for the Hill Country Shootout. Of course the sun was shining bright both days, but it was just too wet to get into the woods. All had a good time, and Beaumont Trophy Hunter Archery is hoping to sponsor another "Outdoor" shoot, maybe this August.

After a short Awards Ceremony, the pop-up targets were set up (Glynn has constructed six pop-up targets), five traditional archers and five compound shooters competed against each other, with compound shooters impressed with the stick shooters and their accuracy. NOTES FROM CHESTER

On Saturday and Sunday, May 17-18th, the 16th Annual Stick Bow Round Up was held at Camp TaKuLa in Chester, Texas. For the second year in a row, the weather was great, with a cool front moving in Friday night, cooling temperatures and lowering humidity. Field and Stream Bowhunters would like to thank all that came to shoot, and thank all the vendors who came to show their wares. This year, we had 271 participants shoot over the two-day event, raising \$1,500 for cancer research and \$2,200 for the camp. Selling raffle tickets for items donated by the vendors and other individuals in attendance raised the \$1,500.

On Sunday afternoon, we had a short memorial for one of our members. Tom Corley, who died this past year after fighting cancer for almost two years. I had a few notes written down to say, but I could not, so if I may, I would like to put them here. "This is our 16th year to hold the Stick Bow Round Up. It has become a family reunion of sorts for traditional archers in Texas and Louisiana. Each year we hold a raffle of items, with the money raised donated to cancer research. In the past, the money raised was donated in memorial to Glenn Parker. This year we will add Tom Corley's name to that memorial. Field and Stream Bowhunters have lost two members to cancer during this time--they were more than members, they were brothers. The first to lose his battle to cancer was Glenn Parker, bow maker of the Grev Wolf bow, whose name we have included in the name of this shoot. This last Thanksgiving we lost Tom Corley after a two-year battle with cancer. Tom worked as a machinist in the paper production industry. He has been involved in bow hunting and traditional archery for a long time, having participated in archery tournaments for a long time. Tom's grandson Tanner, who is with us today, came to most if not all archery tournaments with Tom. We started a tradition here, that when one of our members dies, we shoot one arrow into the woods as our way of memorializing and saying goodbye to that member. Today we ask Tanner to shoot that arrow for us."


