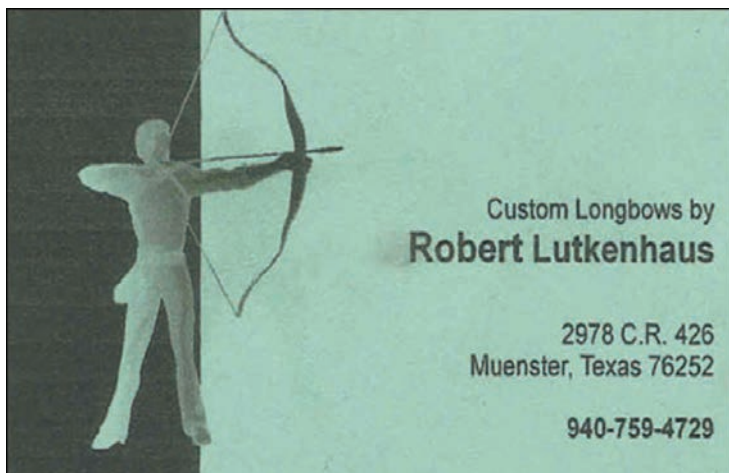

## **TBoT Tournament Rules**

1. Must shoot off the shelf. No Moving parts. When assembled, the working bow is to be one solid piece.
2. No sights or markings on the bow or string. Index finger must be touching the string and nock of the arrow at the same time to prohibit string walking.
3. Arrows are to be no less than 6" shorter than the draw length of the archer using the bow, e.g. to allow for Turkish, siper-type overdraws but to disallow vertical crossbows. Broadheads are not allowed.
4. Release shall be accomplished with the digits of the drawing hand.
5. Binoculars are allowed at all TBoT tournaments, but shall not be used once the shooter is at the shooting stake. No rangefinders allowed.
6. Minimum of Three (3) shooters/participants per group. If family members shoot together, there shall also be at least one shooter in the group that is NOT related to the family. No shooting alone.
7. Score keeper must be a shoot participant and be able to visually validate scores.
8. If an arrow bounces back from the target and is witnessed by the group, it shall be the decision of the group to score the arrow as agreed upon, however, this score shall not be higher than 10. Glancing blows (or ricochets) off the target score zero.
9. Some part of the body must be touching the stake. Cubs and mini cubs may shoot from where they feel comfortable.
10. One must shoot the class they signed up for unless approved at the registration desk prior to starting the round.
11. Fun rounds are welcomed but can only be shot after all scoring rounds are shot and score cards turned in.
12. Only one class may be shot per tournament round.
13. Children under 12 must be accompanied by adults on both the practice range and the tournament range
14. All dogs must be kept on a leash.
15. Driving permitted only in designated areas. No driving ATV's on the tournament range without prior consent.
16. Watch for signage indicating Burn Bans in effect.
17. No alcohol on the tournament ranges.

## **TBoT Tournament Grievance Policy**

TBoT has enacted a new grievance policy for instances where a rules infraction is witnessed at a tournament. This policy will be posted at all TBoT tournaments and is as follows:

1. All grievances must be filed at the shoot at which the alledged rules infraction occurs.
2. A grievance fee of \$20 must be paid at time grievance is filed and is non-refundable.
3. Two TBoT Officers shall recruit two TBoT Members who are in good standing, and are participants of the event to form a committee to hear the grievance.
4. A private session will be held, vote taken and decision made.
5. Decision of grievance committee will be final.

# MY FIRST TRADITIONAL DEER!

In early January, I was blessed with the opportunity to go down to a ranch near the King Ranch, and I was able to take a very nice buck with my Traditional Archery Equipment. It's my 1st deer with Traditional, and I've been hunting Traditional for 4 years now, almost exclusively. I shoot a Bear Patriot Longbow, by Byron Ferguson, Tred Barta Wooden Cedar Arrows, Turkey feathers, Woodsman Broadheads. All instinctive, of course.

My guide did a great job putting me right up close and personal with many deer. I had three hunts to make it happen:

1st hunt, Friday evening - We arrived Friday afternoon, checked in the lodge and got our orientation. The lodge was unbelievably gorgeous. I shot a few times at some targets to get my mojo back, and then we loaded the jeep and headed out. We saw many turkeys, Nilgai antelope, and deer on our way into the lodge, as well as on our way out to hunt. Game was everywhere and it wasn't too scared of humans. The animals are really docile there, except for the Nilgai, they run at the first sight of anything. We pulled up to the Primos ground blind and started putting a little corn out about 10 yards from the shooting window. Deer & javelina were already coming up within 30 yards of us right when we arrived. I had a great time videoing all of the animals that evening that were within 10 yards. We had a very nice 10 point, about 145-150 inches, 10 yards from us, but the javelina kept chasing it away. It never gave me just the right shot opportunity. There were many bucks that came by, and countless does. Right at dark, we were just about to go, when suddenly a pack of about 12 hogs came in. I shot and missed twice, just over the top of their backs. It was a little dark probably, and also my bow was hitting the tent pole in the top of the blind. I think that caused my arrow flight to fishtail pretty bad. We arrived back at camp and had Nilgai burrito appetizers by the campfire. Dinner was a 4-5 course meal, starting with stuffed softshell crab, salad, grilled shrimp on grits, and some rich chocolate cake.

2nd hunt, Sat morning - After a huge deluxe breakfast, we loaded the jeep and headed out. Guide Mike, A.K.A, the Blue Bull Bawana, told me on the way out that he had a very nice buck picked out for me today at a difference place. I didn't think the ground blind was going to happen due to the longbow hitting the tent pole at the top of the blind. He told me that this buck was old, had lots of mass, long tines, and his rack almost met together at the front of his rack, but he wasn't real wide. It didn't really matter to me, because harvesting anything with a longbow is a trophy in my book. We stopped in the middle of a small road in a patch of scrub oaks, and Guide Mike started putting some corn out. Mike had me sit right next to the road in plain sight. I wasn't too sure it would work, but he's the guide, right. Right away the javelina started coming out of the woodwork. We sat about 2 minutes and rattled, and a doe came in on the other side of the pigs. We knew the pigs were not going to help us here, so we loaded back up. We went about 1/2 mile away down the road, and set up again. We quietly put the corn out, since the pigs usually come in to the sound of the feeder going off. Mike had me sit about 10 yards away, no cover or anything, just a twig to sit next to. He backed the jeep up, literally, 20 yards from the corn, 10 yards behind us. Now, it's a bright blue jeep, no camo, no cover. You can only imagine what this East Texas country boy is thinking. I really didn't think anything would come in very close. Mike sat in a chair right behind me, and started rattling immediately. A friend sat in the jeep with my camera to film our hunt. Mike rattled pretty lightly, but loud enough to carry a good ways. Within a minute or two, we had deer coming in to check out the mock fight. Our first buck showed up within about 2 or 3 minutes. Thankfully, there were no javelina here. At about 4 minutes, a doe comes trotting by at 10 yards, followed by a young buck. That young buck is followed by a very nice high rack 10 point. That's when Mike taps me on the shoulder and he tells me that's my buck. The bucks chase the doe around in circles for a minute or two and then the doe comes in from my left side, 10 yards away. She stops for just second, and then the big buck emerges, chasing her out from in front of us. Luckily, he stops right at 10 yards to mark where she was standing. I slowly start to raise my stick and string, and he looks my way for a second and looks back down. I get my bow into position, pick out my small pinhole right behind his shoulder, and I pulled my bow back to the release point at the corner of my mouth. When I released, everything felt great. The arrow shot perfectly straight as a laser, and hit its mark perfect behind his shoulder. Immediately, I saw blood shoot out, and I knew I had a perfect shot on the buck of a lifetime. The big buck kicked up like a stallion and ran with his tail pointed out straight horizontally. It was the greatest feeling to know everything came together in perfect fashion, and I was able to connect finally. Thank the Lord! This all happens within 6 minutes of parking the jeep, and getting set up. Talk about a whirlwind! We waited as long as we could, about 10 minutes, and we started to trail him, even though we knew we had a great shot. We found my arrow right away, broken in 2 pieces. Man, that broken cedar arrow is one of the greatest smells!

It had passed all the way through, and I think the buck might have maybe kicked it right as it was coming out. It was covered in blood and as Uncle Ted says, "Where have we seen this before?". We tracked him on a blood trail a blind man could follow. The big old buck ran about 40 yards and had expired. The shot hit both lungs, it was all that was needed to harvest him. This was truly the hunt of lifetime!

3rd hunt, Sat evening - We did end up going back out Saturday evening to the ground blind and another African brush blind to try and harvest a cull buck, or maybe some hogs. I ended up missing two nice feral hogs, and ended up sticking 2 nice feral hogs, but the shots were not great. I tried shooting an inexpensive 2-blade broadhead, but it did not do as well. The arrows didn't penetrate very well and we were unable to find either hog.. One of the shots hit him high in the back, and on the other hog, it hit him about mid-girth, right behind the shoulder blade, but it didn't penetrate well. All in all, we watched a 15 point, 11 point, 3-10 pointers, 4 or 5 eights, and many, many other deer, all within 10-20 yards of our blind, all at the same time!

In summary, this buck is truly a trophy and I will cherish the memories for my lifetime. The kids are already negotiating with who gets to hang the buck in their room when I get it back from the taxidermist!

# Odell Wanderings

(Note: Odell means “of the valley”)

Allow me a few words of introduction and background before I tell some of my bowhunting experiences.

I grew up on the Finlay Ranch that straddled the Eagle Pass/Uvalde dirt road. The road - now paved - is marked FM481. The ranch, a desolate, lonely land where everthing bit, scratched, stung, or stuck a person, was 25 miles from Uvalde. There weren't any amenities in the dilapidated wooden-framed house. The inside walls of the house were the outside walls. And, the wooden-shingled roof leaked when it rained. I remember Aunt Jesse and Uncle Fred Durbon (my guardians) placing buckets, No. 3 wash tubs, and 5-gallon cans in the 4-room house to catch the rain as it dripped from the ceilings. Hot in the summer; cold in the winter. We were poor and didn't know it, but we were happy and content. Uncle Fred cowboied for Mac Woodley, a miserly, wealthy rancher who didn't believe in giving or helping the hired hands beyond the minimum amenities and salaries.

In the fall, because school buses in the 1940's didn't “run” by the Finlay ranch, I boarded with friends in Uvalde when the school semester started. But, I spent every weekend and holiday at the ranch. I looked forward to the summer vacation. I left the ranch at the age of 15, to live with my father and stepmother.

I thank Knox Walker, a Texas A&M research entomologist, for getting me interested in archery. While I was an entomology graduate student, I attended one of his 5-day archery classes in the summer of 1959. I was hooked on popping paper targets and bowhunting, and I have been ever since. Along with my enthusiasm for bowhunting, I also have kept a bowhunting diary. I have recorded every animal I have shot at and missed and every animal that I have killed. I only regret that I don't have as many photos of my hunts as I'd have liked. Money was scarce then, and I had a wife and three young boys to care for.

My first bowkill occurred on the evening of August 7th, 1959, at the Brazos Bowmen Field Archery Range, a few miles west of College Station. Bob Barnes and I - both graduate students in the A&M Entomology Department - had finished shooting a round at the range. We were walking to the parking lot when a cotton rat dashed across the lot and hid in a brush pile. We slowly circled the pile hoping to get a shot at the rodent. I spotted the rat and weaved an aluminum arrow through the tangles and pinned the rat. The first animal to be recorded in my bowhunting diary.

On September 11, at the range, I shot two cottontails, if I remember correctly, at target No. 7. As I walked to the target to pull the arrows and record the score, I spied the first rabbit squatted in a yaupon thicket a few yards from the target. I shot four times through the brush before I scored. I shot the second cottontail on the way to the next target. Again, it took me four shots through the brush to bag the rabbit. Both rabbits were killed at ten yards. Alice fied the two rabbits for the evening meal.

The first bullfrog I killed was a stinky situation. We were living temporarily in Kingsville, Texas, and I was teaching general biology at Texas A&I Colleg (now a university). Alice was pregnant with our second son; since we didn't have insurance, I had to leave A&M and get a job to pay for the baby.

I met Mike Patterson, a student in my freshman biology class, in the spring of 1961. He and I both enjoyed hunting and fishing and became good friends. Somewhere in our many conversations he mentiond seeing a huge bullfrog at the Kingsville sewage plant. Of course, this interested me, and I asked if he would show me.

Mike drove me to the plant and parked near what looked like a large mud puddle. He said the mud hole was a seepage from the settling ponds. Naturally, I was a bit hesitant about shooting an animal that hung around a sewage plant. Mike told me not to worry about a thing because there was no human waste in the water. I half way believed him.

He told me where he had seen the frog several times, and we could slip up close enough for a shot before the frog spooked. He pointed to a clump of tall grass near the edge of the mud hole and whispered, “Get low and sneak up to that clump. The frog should be sitting off to the left a few yards. It'll be a close shot. I'll wait here.”.

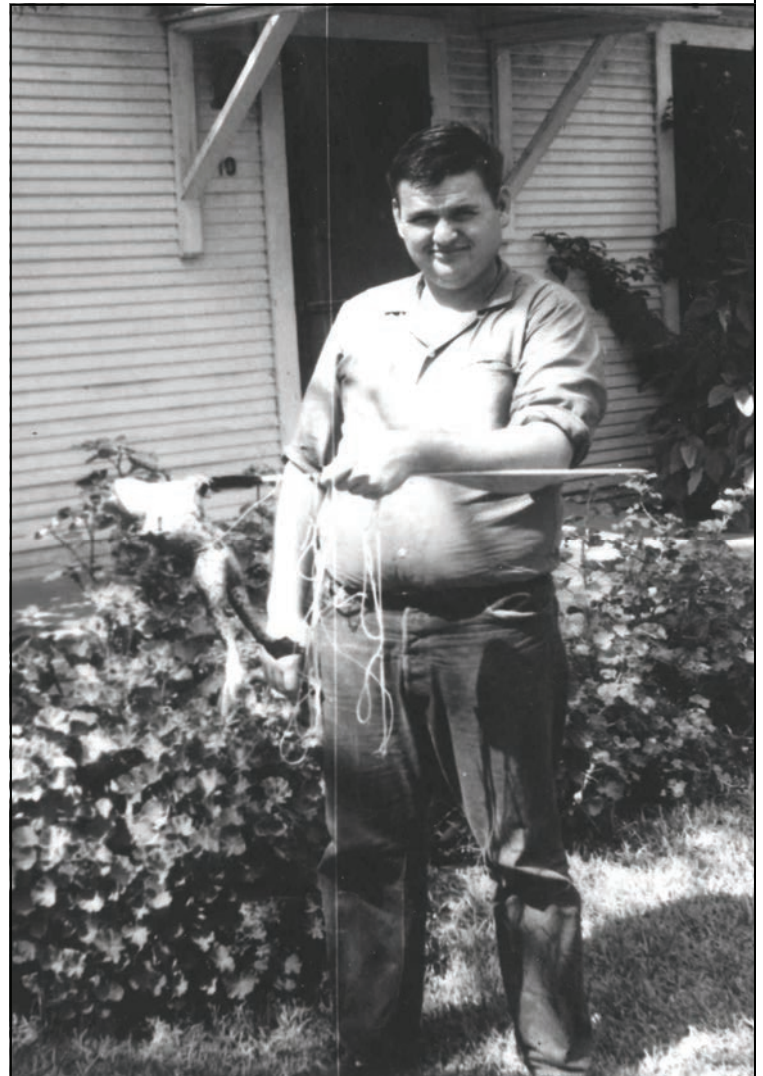
I nocked the fiberglass fishing arrow tipped with a Bear fishing point and eased toward the grass. At the clump, I waited for a couple of minutes before peering over the grass. Sure enough, the huge frog sat where Mike said he'd be. Slowly, I raised the 45-lb pull Bear polar bow, aimed, released, and pinned the frog to the muddy bank.

The frog measured 19 1/2-inches from the tip of its nose to the tip of its longest hind toe. The frog weighed 1 1/2-lbs. This was the largest bullfrog I have ever shot.

These three species of animals are embedded in my memories. I can recall them as vividly as I can remember my first kiss with Barbara when we were freshmen in Pope Junior High in San Antonio, Texas.

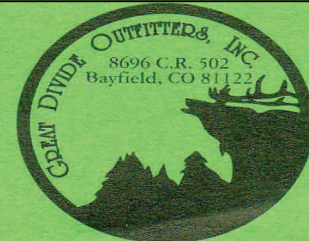
