RADITIONAL

Picture this: you are standing on the edge of a long sendero, surrounded by cactus and mesquite, answering a long overdue call of nature, when your hunting partner announces, "Pssst, they're behind us."

You look over your shoulder and 30 yards away, standing on your hip quiver, is the group of Javalina you are supposed to be stalking. Now you may ask yourself, "How does one end up in a situation like this?"


Well, it started toward the end of deer season, a deer season that had not gone as planned. You see, I had done my scouting, placed my stands and with plenty of practice was feeling more confident than ever. As the weeks turned into days before opening morning, I was informed that there would be no hunting this year on the land where I was set up to hunt. I was at a loss. Two days before deer season and nowhere to hunt! So being forced into it, I went to the National Forest with no stands, scouting or preparation ... and the results showed it. The majority of my season was spent scouting for movement patterns, funnels, and stand location for late season or next year. Now don't get me wrong, anytime in the woods is a good time; I just don't like being unprepared. So, with a lackluster deer season coming to a close, a hunting buddy of mine. Gene Gulledge, brought up the idea of a Javalina hunt in February. Well, I have never been on a Javalina hunt, much less one you have to pay for, and I have always had a sour taste about some places that call shooting a fenced-in animal "hunting." I have been hunting ever since I can remember and always for wild, free-roaming animals. So I had big reservations on accepting his offer. Gene showed me the brochure and I called the number of the hunt coordinator. It turned out the hunt would be held on a 90.000 acre ranch with no high fencing and bow hunting only. Hey, this sounded pretty good, so the date was set for February. When we arrived, the sheer size of the place was overwhelming. They actually had navigational beacons so you could find your way out at night!

On arrival, the first day we were busy setting up camp and trying to locate a good area to hunt. Being a native of East Texas, the terrain was surprising to me, as I had never hunted this far south. I mean, I was expecting cactus but not ALL cactus. Even the trees had thorns. The first two days of the hunt were uneventful except for the company and the beautiful country where we were hunting. On the third day of the hunt, another hunting buddy who went on the trip, Roy Brown, radioed me that he had made a long stalk and needed help blood trailing. He gave me directions, and I drove to the area where he was located.

It was a long sendero running north and south, and I was in the middle. You could see close to a mile in either direction. I called Roy on the radio to pinpoint his location. He came back that he was south and on another stalk. I dug out my binoculars and sure enough, there was Roy at the southern end of the sendero, stalking up on a very big feral hog, so I propped up to watch the show. From my vantage point, it looked like Roy was about 50 yards away and closing in on the huge pig. He cut the distance to what looked like 20 yards, and I saw him duck behind a large cactus as the big hog fed his way. Fifteen, then 10, then five yards as I watched, but no arrows flew. The hog looked like it fed right past the cactus Roy was behind and still no arrows flew. I was mentally screaming, "Shoot, shoot!" as the hog fed off into the thicket. A moment later, Roy came across the radio and called for me to pick him up. I drove to where he was and found myself puzzled as to why he didn't take the shot. Upon arrival, Roy was very flushed and out of breath. I asked, "Why didn't you shoot?" He claimed the pig was out of range. Now I'll tell you, to this day I swear that Roy saw that big pig with those long tusks and hid behind that cactus "till the bad thing went away." But I could be mistaken.

Roy had already found his Javalina and with renewed vigor we set back up for the rest of the evening. That evening, we had several stalks and numerous sightings but could not connect with any. That night in camp we laughed and joked about the day's events and could hardly wait for the morning.

Morning dawned cool and foggy. We were set up on the same sendero as the evening before. The fog was fairly thick and was hampering visibility, so we were killing time until it lifted a little. I was drinking sodas, and Roy was sipping coffee while tinkering with his bow. At about 8:00 am, the fog was lifting pretty well, when the call of nature hit me (too many sodas). I stood up to relieve myself when the first Javalinas were sighted. Well, I was just going to have to wait. It was hunting time, so I grabbed my longbow and took off. Roy fell in beside me, he on one side of the sendero, I on the other. The Javalinas were about 150 yards off and we quickly closed the distance to 50 yards. Just ahead of me, the cactus opened up slightly to where it looked like I could ease around through the thicket and come up along side of them. I motioned my intention to Roy, who nodded that he would try the same on his side of the sendero. I made my way to the place I could slip in toward the cactus and undid my hip quiver, placing it on the ground. Carrying two arrows, I started making my way through the brush in an attempt to parallel the group. I had closed the distance to 20 vards when another group of Javalinas spooked from farther in the thicket, taking our group with them. Roy had made good progress on his side and was straight across from where I stood. He motioned to wait and see if they would come back. We took up positions overlooking the sendero in either direction, when I remembered what I had to do before we started this stalk: I had to GO, BAD! We waited maybe 10 minutes and I motioned to Roy that I couldn't wait any longer. I stood up and started to relieve the pressure when I heard Roy "Pssst." I looked at him and he was motioning behind me. I looked over my shoulder. Thirty yards behind me, standing on my quiver, was the group of Javalina we were stalking. I finished what I was doing and turned around to try to close the distance, but now the wind was at our backs. I did manage to get a few yards closer before they winded us and hightailed it. As I walked back to my quiver, I

My First Bow Hunting Esperience, by Wyatt Landrum

My first hunting experience with my bow was way back when I was about 7 years old. I was with my dad and I was hunting with my longbow. We were hunting pigs at the First Point Bow Hunting ranch. We had been looking for pigs all weekend. We had tried different stands and set ups. Because of the drought the pigs had had been on the move for water. We hunted many weekends with no luck. Then I became ill and missed a weekend.

When I got to go hunting again, my dad told me that he had come across a group of pigs in a different area that normal on the ranch. So my dad and I set up in the new area of the ranch. My dad set up a double bull popup blind in the brush and we waited. We saw everything but pigs.

Two days later and the final day of my hunt my dad decided to change things up again. He set up his double bull blind in the middle of the road. He feed corn right in front of the blind. I was in high hopes this would work. Then I stared to cough and my dad had to get out of the blind and get cough drops. My cough was so bad that the deer that had been closer by now were taking off.

It finally started to get dark and my dad started to take out all our gear and put it into the truck. He was about ready to take the blind down when we heard corn crunching; my dad looked up and told me get back into the blind now. As we got back into the blind he told me get ready they are close. As the pigs stepped into my shooting lane I started to shake like a leaf. I managed to draw my bow and let my arrow fly. Then the pig I was aiming for spun and the arrow caught him in the back.

My dad told me we should go back to camp and get the trailing dog. We put the dog on the trail of the pig and the dog found my pig 40 yards in the brush dead. We loaded him up and took him back to camp. Everyone was so surprised I shoot him with a long bow.

This was my first bow hunting experience. I learned a lot from it. My dad showed me not to give up even when things don't go as planned.

Bowhunting; a place of refuge, silence, relaxation, and an escape from the chaos of everyday life. Bowhunting is not just something I do but it's a part of who I am. To some its just a sport but to us bowhunters is where we regain our sanity.

Ever since I was little my father has taken me hunting. I have grown up in this sport and I love every minute of it. On Christmas morning of my fifth grade school year I woke up to my first bow. I couldn't have been more excited when my dad took the time to help me get set up. I was hooked from the first shot and ever since then I have been a bowhunting addict.

As the alarm went of at 5:00 am I jumped up, threw on my coveralls, slipped on my boots, and grabbed my bow. I couldn't wait to get to what we refer to as "The honey hole" the place was covered with hogs I was almost guaranteed a shot. So my dad got geared up and we headed out to the stand. He got me set up on top of our Bad Boy buggy and he sat in a lock on up in an old oak tree about 25 yards from me. It was a cool, crisp morning and as day began to break the birds were chirping and the squirrels were barking chasing each other up and down the trees. As the dense fog began to clear through the sunlight the feeder went off. I anxiously waited for the little critters to come out. And after about 30 minutes I heard the brush crashing as if a bulldozer was coming through. My heart was pounding, I was shaking all over, nervous, and I was ready to pin one down. I was surveying the area and out of the corner of my eye I saw a big black shadow. It was a big sow hog. She poked her head out checking to see if it was safe to come out. But little did she know I was sitting in the brush on the other side, bow in hand, ready to shoot. She walked out about 15 yards and stopped starred right at me, right in my eyes. I thought she had busted me. We had a stare down for a good minute or so. I sat as still as possible not moving an inch. I still remember those dark beady eyes with white circles around them. After she felt as if I was no threat to her she proceeded on to the feeder. She crunched the corn in her powerful jaws. I looked at my dad and he gave me the go ahead to make the shot. I drew back, shaking like a leaf, and put it right behind her shoulder. When I released she squealed and ran. When I saw her fall about 20 yards out I knew I had just harvested my first animal with a bow and was the happiest kid on earth.

That moment I felt as if I conquered the world. I was so proud of myself as well as my dad. He was so happy for me. I never felt so proud of myself in my life. That was a stepping stone in my life in which I will never forget. To this day I take every opportunity I get to go bowhunting with my father. It's a passion not just a leisure sport. I love bowhunting more than any other sport out there.







TBoT Classes

Please note the age for the senior classes changed from 55 to 62.

Seniors-Over 62 - any bow, any arrows Selfbow (a bow composed of one piece of wood from end to end allowing decorative backing of animal skin or sinew) - wood arrows only Composite (all wood with no fiberglass) - wood arrows only Men's Recurve Open — carbon, aluminum arrows, i.e. synthetic arrows (no wood arrows) Men's Recurve Wood - wood arrows only Men's Longbow Open — carbon, aluminum arrows, i.e. synthetic arrows (no wood arrows) Men's Longbow Wood - wood arrows only Ladies Seniors - Over 62 - any bow, any arrows Ladies Recurve Open - carbon, aluminum, i.e. synthetic arrows (no wood arrows) Ladies Recurve Wood - wood arrows only Ladies Longbow Open - carbon, aluminum, i.e. synthetic arrows (no wood arrows) Ladies Longbow Wood - wood arrows only Boy's Recurve (15-17) - any arrows Boy's Longbow (15-17) - any arrows Girls Recurve (15-17) - any arrows Girls Longbow (15-17) - any arrows Boy's Recurve (12-14) - any arrows Boy's Longbow (12-14) - any arrows Girls Recurve (12-14) - any arrows Girls Longbow (12-14) - any arrows Cubs (9-11) - Recurve or Longbow, any arrows Mini Cubs (8 and under) - Recurve or Longbow, any arrows

TBoT Tournament Rules

- 1. Must shoot off the shelf. No Moving parts. When assembled, the working bow is to be one solid piece.
- 2. No sights or markings on the bow or string. Index finger must be touching the string and nock of the arrow at the same time to prohibit string walking.
- 3. Arrows are to be no less than 6" shorter than the draw length of the archer using the bow, e.g. to allow for Turkish, siper-type overdraws but to disallow vertical crossbows. Broadheads are not allowed.
- 4. Release shall be accomplished with the digits of the drawing hand.
- 5. Binoculars are allowed at all TBoT tournaments, but shall not be used once the shooter is at the shooting stake. No rangefinders allowed.
- 6. Minimum of Three (3) shooters/participants per group. If family members shoot together, there shall also be at least one shooter in the group that is NOT related to the family. No shooting alone.
- 7. Score keeper must be a shoot participant and be able to visually validate scores.
- 8. If an arrow bounces back from the target and is witnessed by the group, it shall be the decision of the group to score the arrow as agreed upon, however, this score shall not be higher than 10. Glancing blows (or ricochets) off the target score zero.
- 9. Some part of the body must be touching the stake. Cubs and mini cubs may shoot from where they feel comfortable.
- 10. One must shoot the class they signed up for unless approved at the registration desk prior to starting the round.
- 11. Fun rounds are welcomed but can only be shot after all scoring rounds are shot and score cards turned in.
- 12. Only one class may be shot per tournament round.
- 13. Children under 12 must be accompanied by adults on both the practice range and the tournament range
- 14. All dogs must be kept on a leash.
- 15. Driving permitted only in designated areas. No driving ATV's on the tournament range without prior consent.
- 16. Watch for signage indicating Burn Bans in effect.
- 17. No alcohol on the tournament ranges.

TBoT Tournament Grievance Policy

- 1. All grievances must be filed at the shoot at which the alledged rules infraction occurs.
- 2. A grievance fee of \$20 must be paid at time grievance is filed and is non-refundable.
- 3. Two TBoT Officers shall recruit two TBoT Members who are in good standing, and are participants of the event to form a committee to hear the grievance.
- 4. A private session will be held, vote taken and decision made.
- 5. Decision of grievance committee will be final.
