



"What Does Traditional Archery Mean to Me"

Traditions are an important way of preserving memories as you mature throughout your lifespan. It preserves the past to help mold the future. Traditional archery is just that to me, traditional memories. My first traditional memories are wonderful memories of my family being together and practicing shooting 3d targets, going to tournaments, and striving hard to win a TBOT buckle. One of my favorite traditional memories happened about two years ago. My mom, sister and I were practicing with our long bows and a rabbit hopped over in front of our target. We all shot at it, but I hit it! I pinned it to the ground and I was so proud! We took pictures and I couldn't wait to brag to my brothers about my first long bow kill! Somehow, I just felt more accomplished being able to shoot the rabbit with my traditional bow than with my gun through a scope.

Traditional archery is a way of preserving history. By preserving history, future generations will have stories to reflect upon and be able to preserve and protect the past. Traditional archery was evident from the very early part of human history and has played a vital role throughout time. Many different cultures have utilized



the traditional bow to feed and protect themselves throughout history. When countries' militias first developed, they used archery as a means of defense. As they progressed their weaponry, the rifle was developed and people found it more proficient and faster. It has also taught me a great life lesson, although I am not enjoying the learning process. As much as I enjoyed shooting my longbow, I am anxious to be able to get back to it. I am positive I will be able to enjoy traditional archery again. In the meantime, I will continue to keep myself involved in anything to do with the outdoors.





TBoT with Ishi and Pink Feathers

Old-timer TBoT members know who Old Ishi was...and now the "newbies" will learn a little history about him and Pink Feathers and their involvement in the Traditional Bowhunters of Texas. My husband, Dan Lockhart, used the nickname Ishi and gave me, Carol, the nickname Pink Feathers.

When we moved to Bryan 20 years ago this fall, Dan was trying to connect with traditional shooters and couldn't find much information. He had earned a master's degree in Computer Science from Texas

A&M in the 60's, but not many traditional shooters were really computer savvy in 1997. So, in frustration over the lack of information available online, Dan purchased the domain TEXASARCHERY.COM (no longer available) and started calling folks in order to get information out about shoots—and we discovered TBoT.

Most folks reading this would classify archery as mostly an outdoor experience, but for many years we may have spent more time on archery inside—sitting side by side at our two desktop computers. From 1998 to 2007, we met and made many wonderful friends by going to archery tournaments and a few hunts. I'll mention many of these folks as I give a little history lesson here (there's not enough room for all the names, so please don't feel hurt if I don't mention you.)

One of the first friendly faces of TBoT we met was Debbie Keeling. She was registering people and handing out flyers about shoots. I think she was also editing and sending the Newsletter at that time. So, we joined TBoT, and by early 2000 we were the ones producing the TBoT Newsletter. David Bailey was the president, and Sandy Horne was the secretary. I think that mailing newsletters still required licking a stamp! By the 2nd Quarter of 2000, mail was stamped with a postage meter, and the address label included the membership expiration date. Later that year we obtained a bulk mail permit, and the newsletter was available online at texasarchery.com.

In 2002 we started working with new officers, president Glenn Bryant, vice president Bill Decker, and secretary Peggy Casey. TBoT offered a t-shirt or cap to members whose photos or stories were published. I particularly appreciated Bill Decker's regular and timely contributions. In 2002 Old Ishi wrote the code and developed the TBoT website and included a detailed tutorial in the newsletter to help folks learn how to navigate the site. To save money, we tried to send the newsletter by email, but it was too large for the servers used by most... We also used the database to address the mailings—no more labels!

In 2003 the newsletter was available in color on the website; the Bryants sent in a recipe for venison jerky; we included "redneck humor," references to a member named Dick Grande (smile if you remember!), and a profit and loss statement for 2002; plus Chuck Menton started his tenure as legislative chairman, keeping us informed of new and proposed laws and regulations.

In 2005, Glenn Bryant served his third term as president, and Roy "Peanut" Brown became vice-president. Through all those years (and more), Pat Handley faithfully served as range captain, always writing up a thank you for all those who helped. Old Ishi offered in the newsletter to send reminders by email for upcoming shoots and schedule changes, but I don't think anyone took him up on the offer. By now members could post their videos and photos on the website, and many took advantage of this feature. Chris Flynn volunteered to call members to notify or remind them of upcoming shoots. Later, Chris became your representative-at-large and wrote several informative articles on archery happenings around the state.

2006 brought Morris Williams as president and Brenda Stein as secretary. Morris started the "President's Photo Pick," which appeared on the outside of the folded newsletter. Dan (Ishi) offered a forum for communication by members on tbot.org. He also did preliminary programming for members to pay dues by using PayPal; only one person responded, so it was never set up. As webmaster, Dan worked tirelessly to do everything he could to make the technical side of TBoT easier for the officers and membership. That year in the newsletter we included 70 "bad" email addresses so members could update their personal information; only 10 responded. In 2006 there were actually five newsletters, the last one mailed in January of 2007, to 532 members, 273 of whom had expired memberships. We worked with Brenda Stein to try to get people to pay their dues. (I wonder how that's going now...) In 2006 Denton County Archery Club went "all traditional." We included the Bowhunter's Prayer by Bill Wray in the newsletter; I plan to resubmit it for another issue.

2007 brought a purging of the database so we were not mailing to those whose dues were three years delinquent. I think it must have gotten some folks' attention. We received and published the first classified ad in several years and an interesting article on easy tick removal. Our lives changed considerably that year with my 97-year-old mom coming to live with us. I could not attend shoots, and we started looking for a

new editor for the newsletter. The last issue that I edited was the 4th quarter of 2007, and I turned it over to Wes Adams. Unfortunately, at nearly the same time, my dear Dan contracted pneumonia with MRSA on the trip when we were returning my mom to Kansas. Dan was admitted to a small hospital in the town where we were married in 1961, was mediflighted to Oklahoma City and passed away less than a month later. Of course his death was a huge blow to me, and it really affected the archery community, too. Dan had trusted Christ as his Savior as a child and continued to serve Him all his life. I rejoice that he is in the presence of the Lord and look forward to seeing him in heaven. I knew nothing about running the website, so eventually it had to be shut down and TBoT hired someone to do what Dan had done "for fun" for about eight years. I am planning to submit the paper copies I have of the newsletter so they can eventually be digitized and posted on tbot.org. I hope this article has brought to your mind many good memories.

Dan and I had a great experience serving the Traditional Bowhunters of Texas, and I hope to continue going to shoots as long as possible. Dan often helped with set-up and take-down at the Hill Country Shootout, and I helped check the math on the scorecards. I am going to end this "history lesson" on a more positive note with more personal information about Old Ishi and Pink Feathers.

Dan grew up shooting bows, and in 1963 I started shooting, too. Then our four kids entered the scene, and I didn't shoot for 35 years. Dan continued to shoot a traditional bow, then a compound for a few years, and in about 1997 he bought us each a Great Plains recurve. I can't remember when, but at Vanderpool one year we bought Winterwind longbows from Dale Sanford. We both continued to enjoy shooting both recurves and our new longbows. At some point Dan started making all of our arrows, and I have a few of them left—but I'm reluctant to shoot them where there are lots of rocks! Then we bought 21st Century longbows from Milton Calloway, and that bow has been my bow of choice for over a decade. One time I went to the Midsummer Meltdown and accidentally took his bow. No wonder I was getting tired so fast! Then at the Texas State Longbow Championship in May I won the only door prize in a scorecard drawing - a beautiful new longbow by Michael Reid - 42# at 28" - exactly what I was already shooting, plus a dozen arrows by Jeff Murray at 10 Again Arrows. So look out! I actually intend to practice this year before the spring shoots...if my shoulder heals well from a planned surgery later this fall. Some of you know that I went hunting for the first time since Dan died. No luck, but lots of fun anyway!

I have thoroughly enjoyed looking back through the newsletters that I edited over the years. It brought back so many memories, and I am thankful to God for all my friends, both old and new, in the Traditional Bowhunters of Texas.

Releasor, and his/her participating family members or guest, parent or guardian in the event Releasor is a minor, agree to fully indemnify, defend and hold Releasees harmless for all Releasor's actions or omissions while at the host. There is no limit to this indemnity.

Releasor assumes full responsibility for the risk of bodily injury, death or property damage due to the negligence of the Releasor or any other third party or thing while at the Releasees Facility, and while competing, officiating, working, practicing, or for any purpose at the Releasees Facility.

- Only point bow at intended targets.
- Never nock an arrow until the intended target is clear of other shooters.
- Stay on designated paths. •
- Look for arrows only after competition is completed for the day. •
- If returning to look for lost arrows, place a marker on your equipment in front of the target. •
- Adults must supervise children at all times. •

TBOT Tournament Rules

- 1. Must shoot off the shelf. No Moving parts. When assembled, the working bow is to be one solid piece.
- 2. No sights or markings on the bow or string. Index finger must be touching the string and nock of the arrow at the same time to prohibit string walking.
- 3. Arrows are to be no less than 6" shorter than the draw length of the archer using the bow, e.g. to allow for Turkish, siper-type overdraws but to disallow vertical crossbows. Broadheads are not allowed.
- 4. Release shall be accomplished with the digits of the drawing hand.
- 5. Binoculars are allowed at all TBoT tournaments, but shall not be used once the shooter is at the shooting stake. No rangefinders allowed.
- 6. Minimum of Three (3) shooters/participants per group. If family members shoot together, there shall also be at least one shooter in the group that is NOT related to the family. No shooting alone.
- 7. Score keeper must be a shoot participant and be able to visually validate scores.
- 8. If an arrow bounces back from the target and is witnessed by the group, it shall be the decision of the group to score the arrow as agreed upon, however, this score shall not be higher than 10. Glancing blows (or ricochets) off the target score zero.
- 9. Some part of the body must be touching the stake. Cubs and mini cubs may shoot from where they feel comfortable.
- 10. One must shoot the class they signed up for unless approved at the registration desk prior to starting the round.
- 11. Fun rounds are welcomed but can only be shot after all scoring rounds are shot and score cards turned in.
- 12. Only one class may be shot per tournament round
- 13. Children under 12 must be accompanied by adults on both the practice range and the tournament range
- 14. All dogs must be kept on a leash.
- 15. Driving permitted only in designated areas. No driving ATV's on the tournament range without prior consent.
- 16. Watch for signage indicating Burn Bans in effect.
- 17. No alcohol on the tournament ranges.

TBOT Tournament Grievance Policy

- 1. All grievances must be filed at the shoot at which the alledged rules infraction occurs.
- 2. A grievance fee of \$20 must be paid at time grievance is filed and is non-refundable.
- 3. Two TBOT Officers shall recruit two TBOT Members who are in good standing, and are participants of the event to form a committee to hear the grievance.
- 4. A private session will be held, vote taken and decision made.
- 5. Decision of grievance committee will be final.

Meetings

There will be four (4) Executive meetings held each year. The EC will have the right to go into a closed door Executive Session if warranted by the situation. There will be one (1) annual meeting of the general membership, although the general membership is welcomed and encouraged to attend all meetings of the Executive Council. Meetings may be held in person, by phone or by TBOT web site chat room.

A. An Executive Council comprising a total of eleven (11) officials shall govern the organization. Except for the President, each member of the EC shall have an equal vote on all issues of interest to the organization. The EC will consist of President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Legislative Representative, Range Captain and Area Representatives, (one each) for the North Texas, West Texas, South Texas, East Texas areas and one At Large position.

The elections for the position of Legislative Representative, North and West Area Representatives will be conducted on odd years.

H. Representatives shall consist of one (1) representative from each designated geographical region. The representatives shall be elected by popular vote from the membership. TBOT will split 50% of the profits from the entry fees with the hosting club.

Crystal Creek, TX Feral Hog Hunt

Crispt November Fall hunt -

I had bowhunted cottontails and feral hogs for years each February at Maurice Chambers' ranch east of Sabinal, TX. Maurice had recently purchased a ranch 16 miles west of Brackettville, TX, north of U.S. Hwy. 90 and 30 miles from Del Rio. After the details from Maurice, I booked a week-end hunt.

The years had rolled by quickly since I'd done any hunting between Brackettville and Rocksprings, and my memory about the November weather there was hazy. Just in case the weather pulled an unexpected norther, I carried foul weather clothing, camo clothes, and my heavier sleeping bag. Of course, plenty of arrows. I had my pick-up truck tuned and ready for the 300-mi. plus drive.

I arrived at the gate in the late afternoon. I met Marvin, the hunt-master, who showed me the rustic, but modern, guest house. It had a well-equipped kitchen, beautiful lounge, and a large dining room. The living quarters were also modern.

As I finished unloading and settling down in the bedroom, Marvin knocked on the door and said he'd give me a wake-up call about 5 a.m. The night ended too soon.

Marvin had the coffee perking, sweet rolls on the table, and a big grin when I walked into the kitchen. "Ready to slay the dragon?" he asked as he looked up from his coffee. "Bright and bushy tailed!" I answered and poured a cup of coffee.

Marvin told me of several stands I could use and suggested the best one for the morning. I was all ears and eager to get on the stand. He also told me that after dropping me off at the stand, that he'd spread corn up and down the road where the stand was located.

"You won't have trouble hearing the hogs. When they come down the gravel road, there'll be squealing, grunting, fighting, and loud chomping as they scorff up the corn. Just be ready; if you see a hog that suits your fancy, be ready to shoot and fast because they don't mess around," he drawled.

I wanted a shoat weighing between 40- to 50-lbs. for barbecuing.

I was ready but over anxious. A shoat fed to within thirteen steps from my blind and hesitated long enough for me to shoot. Evidently, I jerked the boat upon releasing the arrow. It hit the shoat in its left ham.

The hog squealed loudly. Hogs scattered in every direction into the thick underbrush. I thought I heard the shoat crash a few seconds later. I waited ten minutes and left the stand. I eased to where the shoat hesitated when I shot. No blood. Nothing.

Marvin picked my up at dark.

"Well, you did hit the hog. I'll put the dogs to work; they'll find your hog. Let's eat supper first. You can relax while the dogs and I find your hog."

"I'd like to go," I said.

"Naw, I'll have trouble keeping up with the dogs. I don't want to worry about a hunter tagging along. I'll get your hog," he answeed sternly.

Two hours later, Marvin was hanging the hog on the skinning rack.

"Morrison, I had one helluva time dragging that heavy sucker in and around thorny thickets and through white-brush. He's bigger than a shoat, but he'll make lots of chili meat," Marvin grinned as he stood up and leaned against the skinning rack. I field-dressed, quartered the carcass, and iced it down in my ice-chest.

"Let's eat supper. Afterwards, we'll take it easy in the lounge recalling and swapping hunting stories. I'm sure you have some, Morrison, since you've hunted in Canada and New Jersey. I wouldn't think that small state next to New York would have deer and especially not bear! I've heard and read about bear hunting there," Maurice commented as he set his glass of ice-tea beside his dinner plate.

After breakfast the next morning, Marvin and his small, pert, red-headed wife waved good-bye and yelled, "Come back next year."







Gearing Up For Fall Bowfishing

With the end of a long hot summer, bow hunters begin to switch from bowfishing to gear up for deer season. They want to be in top shape to fill their deer tags. And, rightly so. Their hearts skip a beat or so when they see a deer cross the road in front of them or see the flash of a whitetail flag in the brush while checking their deer feeders.

But, it's not the time to lay aside the bowfishing gear. It's a time to take stock of your equipment and be ready for some excellent late summer and early Fall bowfishing.

Start with the bowfishing string. Clip off the first ten feet of the bowfishing string before tying on a fishing arrow; the string probably has plenty of wear and weak spots ... just "looking for a place to break" when tied into a large non-game fish. Also, for increasing the life of the string, wash it in warm soapy water, rinse in clean cold water, and stretch out in the back yard to dry.

If you use an arrow rest - other than the shelf of the bow - check or replace the rest. Years ago, I had driven several hundred miles to fish a West Texas oasis for carp. I guess I had shot five times at grubbing carp and missed. I couldn't figure why I was missing "gimme shots," until I checked the arrow rest. Yep, the Flipper Rest was slightly split, and the rest would-not support the weight of the arrow. Unfortunately, the small town nearby didn't have archery equipment, and I didn't have a spare rest in my fanny bag. So, I improvised with a masking tape and a srip from an aluminum can. Primitive, but it worked.

The third item to check is the fishing point. Check the barbs. If they're bent out of shape or weakened from contant use, either reshape the barbs or replace them. Replace them if there's any doubt about their sturdiness. Carry spare fishing points and plenty of ferrul cement to attach the points to the shafts.

Carry in your fanny bag plenty of nocks, nocking rings to go onto the string, several tubes of super glue, a file, polarized glasses, knife/whitstone, suntan lotion, pliers, insect repellent, side-cutting pliers, a good, wide-brim hat, sturdy fish stringer. In your vehicle have a well-equipped medicine kit, and if you're allergic to arthropod venom, have sting packs; also a small bottle of Adolph's Meat Tenderizer (If stung by wasp(s), make a paste and smear it on the sting site; leave 30 seconds to a minute, rinse, dry, and apply antiseptic.) If highly allergic to arthropod venoms, get immediate medical treatment. Drink plenty of water on a hot sunny day while bowfishing. Be aware of snakes.

Don't trespass. Always carry a current hunting/fishing license and your driver's license. Also, tell someone where

Don't toss the fish back into the water or onto the shore to rot ingloriously. The fishes can be given to friends, to a rendering plant, or use them yourself. There are many recipes for preparing buffalofishes, gars, carp, and gaspergou. Also, they make good scent bait for catfish and varmint lure for trapping.

Gear up for late summer bowfishing for non-game fishes. Shoot all you want but use all you shoot.
