We can always use some new ideas, new challenges, and new faces. As time marches on, some volunteers can no longer help for one reason or another; job, family commitments, and of course age.



Wow, that's some magazine cover. More than I deserve, but thanks.

Hi, I'm Fred. I've been real lucky to shoot rounds with a lot of wonderful archers in the almost 12 years I've been hanging around TBOT events. I appreciate your tolerance of my "skills" and especially when it come to helping me finding my arrows.

Unlike most articles I've read in the magazine, I really don't have a long deliberate history with archery. I'm 1/16th Choctaw Native

American and about half English which may explain my affinity for the longbow, but I only played around with archery until I PCS'd to Texas in 2006. I remember breaking my Father's childhood bow trying to string it up. I still have the 45-50 lb Damart Super Flight Ranger bow I bought when I took archery as a college PE elective. (I got a B). I have a wooden Ben Pearson Bushmaster D-Shaped 60lb barebow (I guess). I played around with archery as my children were growing, but that's was really about it.

All that changed in 2006. I pulled a gun stand at Camp Bullis only to discover that 6 weeks into the season, my area had "shot out". "Shot out of what"? As I was leaving Outdoor Rec, I heard someone say "well, archery season's still open". Cool. Bass Pro had just opened so I bought a Bear Instinct compound and started throwing aluminum arrows all over the range.

During one of the monthly Bullis shoots, I walked past 3 guys with stickbows and I made some crack that I had already killed everything ahead of them. The big guy said, well come on with us anyway. That's were I met my mentor, Perry Sullivan. A big, unassuming guy who I couldn't help but hit it off with. We finished the round and he asked me to join them next month. Sure. That's when the wheel-bow cracks started. OK, I could only take so much, so when I got a 15% off Happy Birthday Bass Pro discount, my daughter and I went and I got my Grizzley. That was it. My son accidentally gave the Instinct away to my daughter's boyfriend/future husband, but that's another story.

I did a bunch of reading, watched a bunch of videos, started shooting league at Fred Ramerez's. Oh well. One day I was hard at work missing big targets with little arrows at the Bullis range when this bunch of guys came down the road making all kind of smartdonkey cracks about my "skill". Fine, let's do this. That's how I met David Oaks.

- Only point bow at intended targets.
- Never nock an arrow until the intended target is clear of other shooters.
- Stay on designated paths.
- Look for arrows only after competition is completed for the day.
- If returning to look for lost arrows, place a marker on your equipment in front of the target.
- Adults must supervise children at all times.

TBOT Tournament Rules

- 1. Must shoot off the shelf. No Moving parts. When assembled, the working bow is to be one solid piece.
- 2. No sights or markings on the bow or string. Index finger must be touching the string and nock of the arrow at the same time to prohibit string walking.
- 3. Arrows are to be no less than 6" shorter than the draw length of the archer using the bow, e.g. to allow for Turkish, siper-type overdraws but to disallow vertical crossbows. Broadheads are not allowed.
- 4. Release shall be accomplished with the digits of the drawing hand.
- 5. Binoculars are allowed at all TBoT tournaments, but shall not be used once the shooter is at the shooting stake. No rangefinders allowed.
- 6. Minimum of Three (3) shooters/participants per group. If family members shoot together, there shall also be at least one shooter in the group that is NOT related to the family. No shooting alone.
- 7. Score keeper must be a shoot participant and be able to visually validate scores.
- 8. If an arrow bounces back from the target and is witnessed by the group, it shall be the decision of the group to score the arrow as agreed upon, however, this score shall not be higher than 10. Glancing blows (or ricochets) off the target score zero.
- 9. Some part of the body must be touching the stake. Cubs and mini cubs may shoot from where they feel comfortable.
- 10. One must shoot the class they signed up for unless approved at the registration desk prior to starting the round.
- 11. Fun rounds are welcomed but can only be shot after all scoring rounds are shot and score cards turned in.
- 12. Only one class may be shot per tournament round.
- 13. Children under 12 must be accompanied by adults on both the practice range and the tournament range
- 14. All dogs must be kept on a leash.
- 15. Driving permitted only in designated areas. No driving ATV's on the tournament range without prior consent.
- 16. Watch for signage indicating Burn Bans in effect.
- 17. No alcohol on the tournament ranges.

TBOT Tournament Grievance Policy

- 1. All grievances must be filed at the shoot at which the alledged rules infraction occurs.
- A grievance fee of \$20 must be paid at time grievance is filed and is non-refundable.
- 3. Two TBOT Officers shall recruit two TBOT Members who are in good standing, and are participants of the event to form a committee to hear the grievance.
- 4. A private session will be held, vote taken and decision made.
- 5. Decision of grievance committee will be final.

Long Shot

fter spending the last two years in a DIY house addition/remodel things where finally beginning to settle down and more time was spent flinging arrows instead of swinging a hammer. This 2017 season would be my first season back with a stickbow in hand since 2009. With the birth of our first daughter and a job in the oilfield I just could not seem to find the time to shoot and stay consistent so I made the decision to step back for a while. Fast forward eight years and two more daughters the time was here for the longbow to join me afield once again. I was going into this year with two main goals, just have fun and kill at least one whitetail with the longbow.

Early in the season I was fortunate and able to take a spike and a hog, thus completing the goals I had set for myself. This was turning out to be one of the most rewarding seasons for myself in several years. As I watched the arrow pass through the spike this sense of accomplishment and satisfaction washed over me in a way that's hard to explain to most.

As the season progressed the deer movement and patterns took a rapid turn with the start of a very early acorn crop. The deer where still there, we just seemed to not cross paths as often as I would have liked. As time would allow I tried hanging new stands, hunting different stands with good sign and spot and stalk to no avail but still enjoying every minute of this cat and mouse scenario Mother Nature was laying out.

On a warm November 16th I was able to get home from work with enough time for an evening sit. Due to the warm temps I was hesitant to sweat in a pop up all evening so on a whim I grabbed my rattling horns and a newly acquired second hand one eared doe decoy and headed out. Without much of a plan I parked the truck and began a slow walk down a dry creek bed running north and south. As I eased down the edge of the creek bed I was looking for a spot that would offer concealment while allowing room to maneuver my bow. Finding a large Pin Oak laid down by a windstorm a few years earlier I felt this would make a likely hiding spot. I placed my decoy about twelve yards east of the dead fall and climbed into the hole in the brush behind. After letting things settle down for a while I began to aggressively beat the horns together while raking the ground and brush around me. I found myself really getting into it all while thinking to myself "this is a looooong shot". As soon as I had placed my rattling horns on the ground in front of me I began trying to look through the brush for any signs of movement. Then I saw it, a small patch of white through a tiny hole in the brush that just looked out of place. I stared at this small white patch through the tangle of briers and Yaupon almost as if I was trying to mentally turn it into more than I knew it was.



Then about the time I decided my eyes where playing with my brain, It moved, It was a deer, It was a buck! As he moved out of the dry creek bed I was only catching bits and pieces due to the tick brush concealing me from his view. As he closed the distance in a stiff legged walk with ears laid back I was able to determine that he was legal under our counties antier restrictions but could not tell much more than that nor did I need to. Now I began starring at the ground and repeatedly telling myself to keep it together as he closed the distance uncomfortably close while working his way between myself and the decoy. As he cleared the brush and came into my view I realized his vitals where obstructed by the tree I was kneeling behind. With his attention focused on his new found love I was able to stand undetected while I focused on an imaginary spot behind his offset shoulder. Just as he began to turn at seven yards to approach the decoy I released my arrow and watched it pass almost effortless through his rib cage and skip to a halt 15 yards beyond the buck. Instantly I knew the shot was good as he ran to my left out of view but he was close enough that I could hear the breath escaping from his lungs and the rustle of the leaves. In one last surge of adrenaline the buck made an attempt to reach the safety of the creek bed but stumbled as he came into view falling where he would stay. Now is when I began to lose it and I can still remember calling my wife with the news of my good fortune but instead scared her half to death because whatever I said was incoherent babble.

I had begun the 2017 season with the sole desire to just have fun and enjoy hunting with my longbow again, never would I have dreamed of the events that took place on that November evening. That particular buck is not my biggest, more or less an average representative for our area but that hunt is at the top of my list. I have to thank my Dad for introducing us to the outdoors at such an early age and turning me onto "traditional archery" as well as teaching that the true trophy is not in the score of an animal but the memories made and journey traveled.

Waiting For the Spring Gar Spawn

By Bob Morrison

The gar start feeling their oats around the middle of April in the Cross Timbers, and by June, the Spring spawn hits a fourth gear. No doubt about it, it's a frantic, rollicking, fast-paced annual ritual that local bow-fishermen have been awaiting. When this time arrives, you should be ready: plenty of fishing arrows, washed and dried bow reel line, waxed bowstring, bow tuned, a valid outdoor sporting licenses, polaroid glasses, and sunscreen lotion. Carry a cell phone in a water-proof container. Don't forget to tell someone where you'll be bowfishing and when you expect to return. Also, don't forget to properly dispose of the fish carcasses. Don't toss'em on shore nor back into the water. This is offensive to everyone that enjoys an outing at their favorite lake, river, or conservation lake.

In one day, you can start on the Brazos River at the Possum Kingdom Lake tailrace, stalk down stream, past SH16 bridge, and on south to the deep holes. Leaving the Brazos, follow SH 16, south and cut over to Lake Palo Pinto and start at the hot-water outlet on the west side. From the outlet, skip over to the dam's small tailrace.

Drive from Palo Pinto Lake to Lake Leon. Bowfishing is usually excellent at the day park on the west side highway to Comanche. The road leading to the tailrace is usually closed to bowfishing the tailrace. (Check with the lake authorities.)

For the last lap, swing down to Lake Proctor, just north of Proctor, TX. There're plenty of inlets, backwaters, coves where spotted gar, especially, congregate for mating rituals. The needlenose gar prefer more open shallow water to spawn than the spotted gar.

Gar are opportunistic carnivores, feeding on live prey such as minnows and sunfishes. One trick that sometimes works - but no guarantee - to draw them in close for a shot is thrashing the shallow water; this stimulates their curiosity.

Gar are edible, but not their eggs, which are poisonous. Most bowfishermen won't clean a gar because of their armor. This is easily handled with tin snipes. Open up the fish and hull out the body. The flesh

is pearly white. The skeleton is cartilaginous. Fillets are easily removed and used in a multitude of fish recipes.

I'd make enough money to buy a few gallons of gasoline or a couple of fishing arrows.

You hear and read about the publicity of "March Madness" in basketball but never "Spring Madness in Bowfishing." Listen closely during the Spring, you'll hear it if you are a bowfisherman.
